Friends Receives \$402,000 Cable Co-op Grant: Huge New Internet Resources for Libraries

It's a delight to start off the New Year with some great news, namely that we are one of the major recipients of the recent Cable Co-op Legacy Grants to the community. The non-profit Cable Co-op sold its local cable franchise a few years ago to what is now Comcast, and found itself with \$4 million left over to distribute to non-profit organizations within the community. Out of more than 220 original applicants, we received a grant of \$402,000, which is about 10 percent of the entire amount Cable Co-op distributed and the third largest of the 26 awards made. It is also the largest grant that the Friends have ever received.

Because the Cable Co-op indicated it would favor projects covering its entire service area, we brought in four other public libraries: Menlo Park, Belle Haven, East Palo Alto, and Atherton. Combined with all five of Palo Alto's libraries, we called this our "9 Libraries Proposal." It was a great delight for us to work with the staff of all the libraries and be able to serve not only our own local system but also those of our neighbors. Indeed, a significant percentage of people in Palo Alto use the libraries of neighboring cities as well.

Children's Library Campaign Reaches Goal Lucie Stern Would Be Proud

More than 800 FOPAL members and townspeople stepped forward with donations so that our much-loved Children's Library will be renovated and enlarged. With the \$1.1 million that FOPAL and the Palo Alto Library Foundation raised and the city's agreed-upon match, the Children's Library project is ready to move forward.

This is truly thrilling news for several reasons. First, it will make a wonderful difference at Children's Library. Second, it is irrefutable proof that the community's can-do, will-do attitude is alive and well in Palo Alto. Third, it introduces what we believe will be a whole new era—one in which the Friends and the newly established Palo Alto Library Foundation will work together to continue to enhance our libraries. That is major.

This fund raising is a whole new experience for Friends. As we began, experienced fundraisers assured us that we probably wouldn't be successful; we were inexperienced, the goal was too high, the down economy would make it impossible, the December deadline was too soon. All of this, of course, made success even sweeter.

Little did we know when we developed and submitted a grant proposal—in about 10 days in December 2002—where it would lead. A wonderfully generous and wise anonymous donor presented us with \$150,000, and a \$200,000 challenge grant, last January.

This grant and challenge absolutely was a community-changing event. It led us in a new direction and helped us learn more about ourselves. She knew that her accompanying challenge grant would energize the community and let us prove to ourselves that we could do it. Aunt Lucie Stern, who built and gave the Children's Library for the children of Palo Alto so long ago, would be proud of our anonymous donor. So are we. Proud and very grateful.

A major goal of the project is to make it easier for library users to access the Internet, and for this we will provide approximately \$190,000 to the five Palo Alto libraries. At the Main and Mitchell Park libraries, there will be a total of 18 Internet-connected laptop computers that you can borrow to use within the building, which is a novel way to fit in more computers into facilities with limited space. New equipment will also allow people with wireless laptops to access the Internet at the Downtown, Children's and College Terrace libraries. There will be new color and black-and-white laser printers and computer furniture at all branches. The antiquated electrical wiring in the 68-year old College Terrace library will be replaced, allowing that building to support additional computers and other equipment.

Another \$69,000 of the grant will go to purchasing and publicizing Internet-based information resources, most of which you will be able to access from any home, school, work, or library Internet-connected computer. We'll describe many of these amazing new materials in future issues. Virtually everyone will appreciate one that we aim to provide, namely the entire New York Times from its inaugural issue in 1851 up through 2001 (a separate free service covers the most current years). As a test, Sylvia Baker, Acting Manager of the Main Library, used the online resource to find quickly what may be the first mention in the New York Times of Stanford University. Here's that article, from page 4 of the November 15, 1885 edition, as it will appear on your computer screen:

SENATOR STANFORD'S GIFT.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 14.—Senator Leland Stanford formally presented to the Trustees at his residence to-day the deed of the property with which it is intended to found and endow the Leland Stanford, Jr., University on the Palo Alto Farm. The gift consists of the Gridley, Vina, and Palo Alto Farms, which comprise 57,000 acres, the present value of which is about \$4,000,000. The Trustees named in the deed are Judge Lorenzo Sawyer, James McShafter, Charles Goodall, Alfred L. Tubbs, Francis A. Spencer, Henry Vroomen, Charles F. Crocker, Timothy Hopkins, Henry L. Dodge, Irving M. Scott, William Ashburner, H. W. Harkness, Josiah Stanford, Horace Davis, John N. Miller, John Boggs, T. B. McFarland, Isaac S. Belcher, John Q. Brown, George E. Gray, and N. W. Spaulding, of California; Matthew P. Deady, of Oregon; William M. Stewart, of Nevada, and Judge Stephen J. Field, of the United States Supreme Court. They are to serve without compensation. All were present except Messrs. Miller, Field, Deady, and McShafter. The deed bears date Nov. 11, and is signed by Leland and Jane Lathrop Stanford. It is witnessed by Stephen T. Gage, E. H. Miller, Jr., Nicholas T. Smith, Herbert C. Nash, and Creed Haymond. It provides that a general plan for the construction of the university building shall be adopted by the Trustees within two years. The deed is beautifully engrossed on white vellum.

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With this resource, you'll now be able to read every article

and advertisement and see every picture in any issue of the New York Times. For students, this means you might watch the Civil War unfold page-by-page, reading exactly what a person living then in New York City would have read. For researchers, you can track issues, companies, and authors, find reviews, and check facts. For fun, you can look up the day you were born or find famous relatives. The New York Times itself charges \$2.95 to view a single article. You will be able to access this and all the other online resources absolutely free by simply using your "magic ticket": your Palo Alto library card.

Beyond the sheer value of these online resources, they represent an important new way in which our libraries can expand. Our libraries, like all others, are so pressed for space that they must discard one item each time another is acquired. Just the New York Times newspapers alone, in their original newsprint format, form a stack 42 stories high, and *could never fit physically into any of our libraries*. In microfilm format, the issues still take up many drawers and require cumbersome microfilm readers. In online format, however, they occupy no space whatsoever in any library building, and are available freely via the Internet from anywhere at any hour. We hope to see far more reference materials in this easy-to-use and space-efficient format, creating in effect a new branch of the Palo Alto libraries in every home, classroom, and office that has access to the Internet.

An incredible set of 45 volunteers and government employees worked on the proposal that we submitted to the Cable Co-op. We couldn't possibly thank them all enough, but their names and roles are listed on page 7. We also wish to thank the members of the Cable Co-op's board of directors for their generosity to all the libraries in our community. Lastly, a big thank you goes to you, our members and library supporters, for giving the Friends of the Palo Alto Library a 66-year reputation of strong success that empowered us to seek and obtain these funds.

At the beginning of the year, I had "important" goals in mind – like quadrupling our membership again, as we did about 10 years ago, organizing and presenting a series of book-related lectures and programs and assuring that every school age youngster in Palo Alto has a library card.

But life is full of surprises and, while not one of my goals was achieved, we did score some stunning successes that we should celebrate. What were some of these successes?

- Our dedicated book sale volunteers, with the help of the Kiwanis moved our entire book sale operation from

Terman, where we'd been for some 20 years, to Cubberley Community Center without missing a sale despite rain, mud, a leaking roof and no power.

- We invited our membership to join the Associates of the Stanford University Libraries for a day trip to the 36th International Antiquarian Book Fair in San Francisco.
- With the help of many of FOPAL members, we "thawed" the vacant position of Library Director, which had been "frozen" and expect to see a new director in place shortly.
- FOPAL offered the City up to \$10,000 to cover the costs of travel and lodging for library director applicants providing the City solicited nation-wide rather than on a local basis.
- Closure of the Downtown Library was averted when our members and local residents turned out to protest the proposed action.
- We sponsored a very special evening program, which nearly 200 people attended, and heard the ever-popular Dr. Fernando Vescia speak on "In Search of Leonardo."
- We applied for and received a grant of more than \$400,000 from Cable Co-op to improve access to Internet and online resources at area libraries.
- Working with the new Palo Alto Library Foundation, FOPAL successfully met the \$1.1 million goal to renovate and expand the Children's Library.

It has been quite a year. My sincere thanks to all members of our board who got a real workout, and to our 100-plus book sale volunteers and to our membership. We could NOT have done it without you.

Among those who deserve special recognition are two board members who went off-board this month: Shelby Valentine, our president for three years, indefatigable promoter of the Library Bond Measure and party-giver *par excellence* and John Burt who agreed to serve as our treasurer this past year never dreaming that he'd be involved in a major fund drive and, at the same time, be a key player in revising our by-laws. Both were stalwarts and contributed immensely.

A warm welcome to Jeff Levinsky, our incoming president who will, I am confident, maintain our current momentum and involvement in library-related issues. The City Manager's decision to create a separate library department reporting directly to him, the now-proven effectiveness of the Library Foundation combined with the ongoing role of the Library Advisory Commission means that there will be ample opportunity in 2004 for cooperation and collaboration with the objective of improving our libraries and library services.

Be prepared for real progress in library-related issues. The stars and planets are properly aligned.

A 'Promotion' for Libraries

As a new Palo Alto library director takes over sometime soon, she or he will be the leader of a City department instead of a division within the Community Services Department—where "the library" has resided for several decades. Is this change simply a bureaucratic detail? In a word, no.

Although invisible to library users, what appears to be a minor change will have real impact on a day-to-day and long-term basis. Here are a couple of examples:

- The reporting structure (direct report to City Manager) will be more efficient and clear, without intermediate levels. Decisions can be made more quickly as access to management information will be enhanced.
- The library director will participate in the senior level city management with other department heads—as a peer. This stature means access: more exposure to the highest decision-makers with the opportunity to "tell the library's story" directly, an expectation of teamwork and respect for authority.

The bottom line: the library's visibility will be raised internally and in the big picture, over time, externally. And the hope is that this change will best serve residents.
